These tours which are as low as \$6.80 for two days to \$23.45 for seven days cover every necessary expense (except meals) from the time of arrival at New York City until departure for periods of 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 days. Included in addition to hotel room are taxicab

(when necessary) to and from Grand Central Terminal and hotel; admission to the Fair, tour of the Fair by guide chair, sight-seeing tour of the city and choice of visit to National Broadcasting Studios at Radio City or admission to Rockefeller Center Observation Roof. Any New York Central agent will be glad to give you complete information regarding these tours.

Optional Routing of Tickets

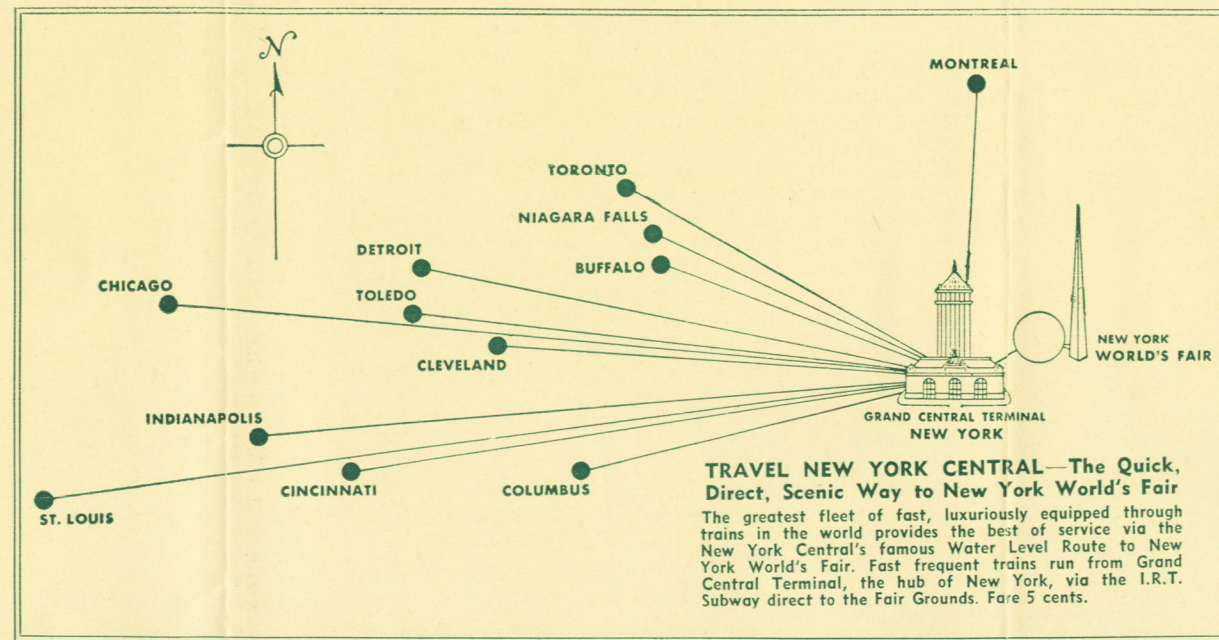
Round-trip tickets issued by or via the New York Central System from Detroit, Cleveland, Cincinnati and any point beyond to New York City will be honored in one direction via the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad or the Pennsylvania Railroad. This enables passengers to see Niagara Falls, the Mohawk Valley, Hudson River, Baltimore and Washington without additional cost or exchange of tickets. The New York Central will honor similarly tickets issued by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad and the Pennsylvania Railroad.

Train Service

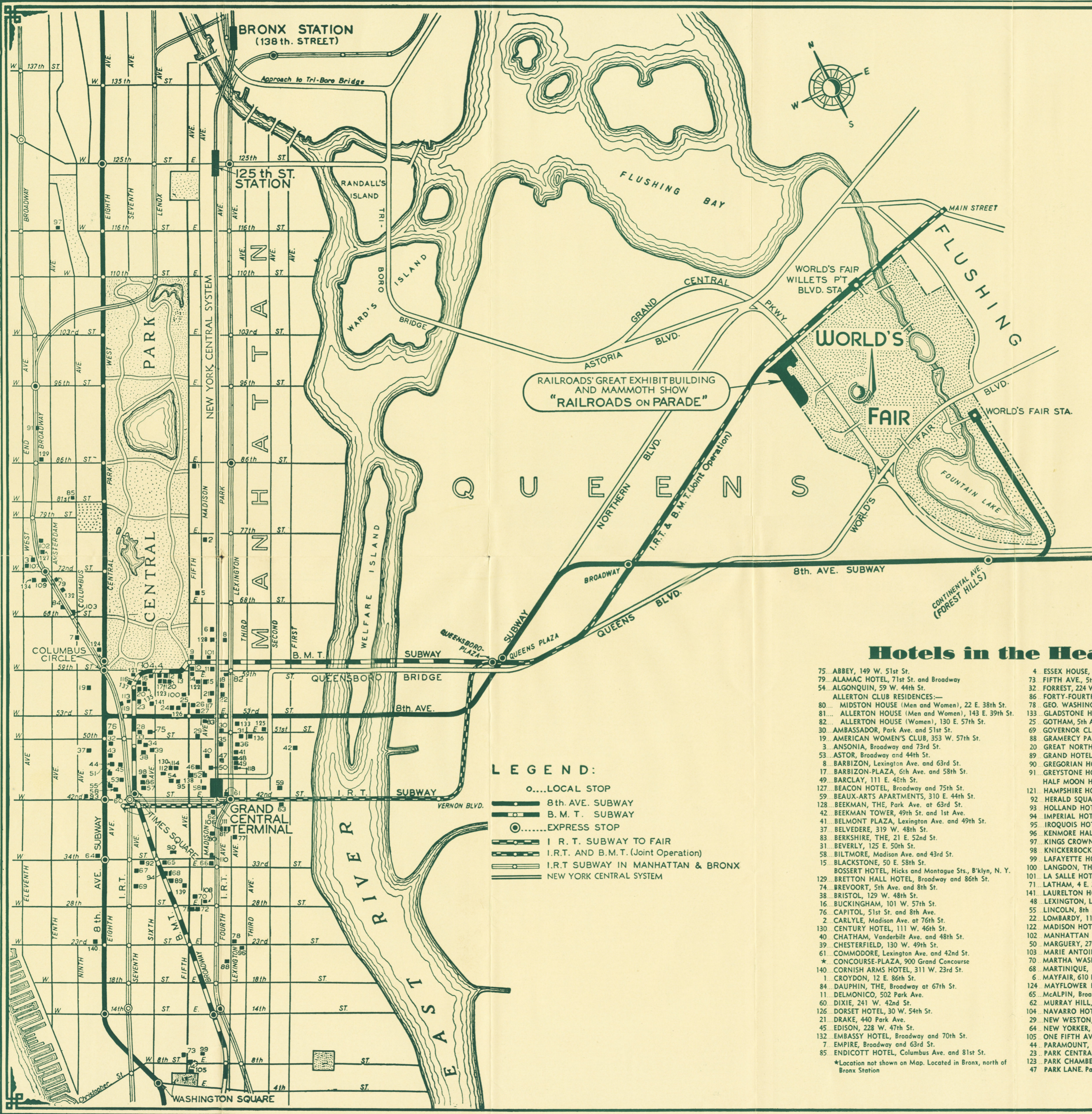
Routes to NEW YORK WORLD'S FAIR

. . . from the Grand Central Terminal Area

Also Rapid Surface Bus Transportation

The Map shows the strategic location of Grand Central Terminal in midtown Manhattan—the great hotel, amusement and residential section of New York. Three subway systems provide the entire area with quick and frequent service to the Fair grounds in approximately 20 minutes as follows:

- I. **The Interborough Rapid Transit Company (I.R.T.) Queensborough Line.** Direct, fast, through service to the World's Fair from Grand Central Terminal; also from Fifth Avenue and 42nd Street and Times Square (Broadway and 42nd Street). THIS IS THE BEST ROUTE FROM THE GRAND CENTRAL TERMINAL—TIMES SQUARE DISTRICT TO THE FAIR GROUNDS. TRAINS EVERY FEW MINUTES. Fare 5 cents.
NOTE: The Queensborough Line intersects the Lexington-Fourth Avenue Line of the I.R.T. at Grand Central Terminal and the Seventh Avenue Line of the I.R.T. at Times Square affording quick connections for people north or south on these lines not located more convenient to stations on other lines mentioned below.
- II. **The Eighth Avenue Subway (Independent Line).** Midtown stations on this subway are located at Eighth Avenue and 42nd Street, 50th Street and Eighth Avenue, 53rd Street and Seventh Avenue, 53rd Street and Fifth Avenue and 53rd Street and Lexington Avenue. Patrons who find the stations of this line most convenient will take **Queens Express Train** to Continental Avenue—Forest Hills, just South of World's Fair Grounds where easy and quick change is made for train to World's Fair. Patrons north of 53rd Street on the Eighth Avenue Line come down to 42nd Street and change to **Queens Express Train** as above, as 42nd Street is the nearest EXPRESS stop. Through fare 10 cents.
- III. **Brooklyn-Manhattan Transit Corporation (B. M. T. Lines).** Midtown Stations are located at Times Square (Broadway and 42nd Street); 49th Street and 7th Avenue (Radio City area); 57th Street and Seventh Avenue; 59th Street and Fifth Avenue and 60th Street and Lexington Avenue. Passengers at all points should take Local to Queensborough Plaza just across the East River, changing there for World's Fair trains. Passengers taking express south of Times Square change to the Queensborough Local at Times Square. Through fare 5 cents. Change can also be made at Times Square to the Queensborough Branch of the I.R.T. by paying an additional fare of five cents which will afford service to the Fair Grounds without further charge.
- IV. **Convenient Bus Transportation.** In addition to the subway lines, buses will run from various points in the Midtown District to the Fair Grounds. Bus service will also be available from New York Central Stations at 125th Street and Bronx Station (138th Street) to the Fair via the Triboro Bridge.
