




The Winning of the West ...




This great Central West, replete with scenes of historic and national interest, is now served by the Rock Island with its many miles of railroad and the finest in transportation.

There is a bar, a lounge, and a spacious dining section. Individually controlled radio permits selective listening.


.The Observation Car ...
